#### Football

##### Year 5 & 6 Girls

# Music @ Henlow

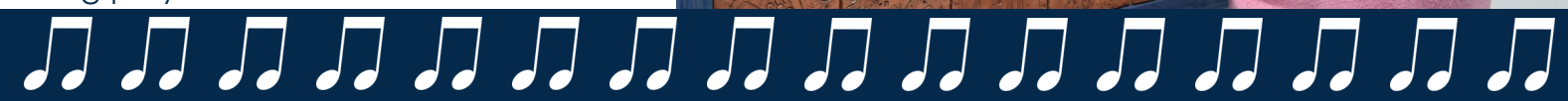

This network of schools is supported by an army of volunteer Enterprise Advisers from local and national employers who are matched with an individual school to work strategically with the school's Careers Leader to enhance the careers offer in school so that all young people are equipped to take their best next step. ### What can I do to support my child?

Young people in secondary education are faced with some challenging decisions about which path to pursue. From GCSE options to choosing their route post-16 and post-18 here are some ways you can support them:

1. Encourage them to explore all options.
2. Help them to access impartial advice and guidance.
3. Talk to them about their strengths and weaknesses.
4. Encourage networking and communication by attending careers fairs or arranging job shadowing.
5. Offer to read through applications and help prepare for interviews.
6. Support their decisions – its natural to have a view on what's best for your child, but their career decisions are ultimately up to them.

By helping your child in these ways you are helping them to choose a path that aligns with their interests, values and strengths.

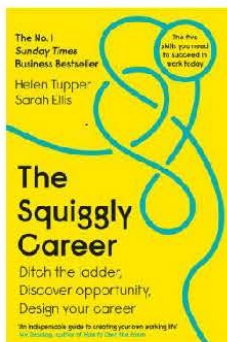

### Childcare Offers for Parents

The Childcare Choices campaign aims to raise awareness and understanding of the support available from the government with the costs of childcare.

With the school Christmas holidays approaching and looking ahead to half term in February, it is more important than ever that your parents and carers are able to access the financial support they qualify for. They could be entitled to:

- up to £2,000 a year of Tax-Free Childcare per child (or £4,000 if disabled) for children up to 11, or 17 if they're disabled
- help with up to 85% of their childcare costs for children up to 16 with Universal Credit
- 30 hours of free childcare for 3 and 4 year olds if they're a working family in England.



### Free School Meals Eligibility and Entitlement

### Emergency support

Emergency provision is available following an emergency or crisis to meet the immediate day-to-day expenses relating to food and utilities. Supermarket vouchers and top-ups for pre-paid energy meters are provided to meet these needs.

To be eligible for the emergency provision you must be:

- permanently residing within Central Bedfordshire
- 16 years or older
- in an emergency situation and not have enough money to meet the immediate needs of you and your family
- able to provide sufficient proof of identity

# Pupil Premium

## Are you eligible for Free School Meals?

If you think you are eligible please contact Central Bedfordshire on the number below. As well as receiving the option to have Free School Meals you may also be entitled to a variety of initiatives at school. These may include free access to Breakfast Club, support with the cost of Food Tech, help towards uniform, subsidised music lessons, help towards the cost of school trips as well as other initiatives throughout the year.

The qualifying benefits to receive free school meals for children in Year 3 and over are:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit, and your annual gross income does not exceed £16,190 as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs)
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- Universal Credit (during the initial roll-out of this benefit)

If you think you meet the free school meals eligibility criteria, please call Central Bedfordshire Council on 0300 300 8306. When you call to apply for free school meals, please have the following information ready:

- National Insurance numbers and dates of birth for you and your partner
- dates of birth for your children
- if you receive support from the National Asylum Support Service, your NASS number

The school will then be informed and you will receive further information.
